Connecting

Group discussion

Read Genesis 5:18-24; Hebrews 11:5-6.

- 1. What does the writer of Hebrews say about Enoch's faith? What does he connect Enoch's faith with (verse 5)?
- 2. *Discuss*. What does Genesis 6:5 say about the heart of mankind during the time of Enoch? If Enoch was born in our day, do you think he would have a harder time living out his faith as compared to living in his time? Why or why not?
- 3. *Discuss*. What do you think is the connection between pleasing God and walking with God?
- 4. What does Amos 3:3 say about walking together? What would this mean for the Christian and for *you* in a practical way? Share some specific experiences.
- 5. Read Galatians 1:10. What is Paul saying about the approval of men versus the approval of God? Does this mean a Christian should be rude and offensive to others? How does one strike a balance?

- 6. *Share.* Would you say that you know God better now than you did before? What do you think should you do when your relationship with God becomes routine or becomes a challenge for you?
- 7. **[NEXT STEPS]** *Ask each one to check the boxes that apply to them.* Consider these suggestions and be ready so share about your experience next week.
 - □ I will commit to go through the devotionals everyday this week.
 - □ I will commit to attend at least one session of the Prayer & Fasting on January 20-24.
 - □ I will intentionally spend _____ minutes every day this week in personal prayer and bible study, not as a duty but with a desire to commune with God.

Closing the session.

- Pray for a freshness and new passion for Christ and his Word.
- Pray for those who are going through personal struggles.
- · Pray for your unsaved family, friends and loved ones.

Personal reflection Ef action.

When asked to highlight the most important commandment in all of Scripture, Jesus responded, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the great and first commandment" (Matthew 22:37-38).

All of Christianity boils down to this one pursuit. And because we are to pursue loving God in all we do, all of life boils down to this single pursuit. Every single thing we do, whether it involves work, family, friends, church, entertainment, school, or solitude, is meant to be marked by the simplicity of loving God.

At the end of our days, the way we loved our heavenly Father will matter most. Our love for God matters more than any achievement, success, or program. It matters more than any possession, status, or relationship. And when we align our perspective with the first and greatest commandment, everything else comes into focus. When we pursue loving God above all else, all other pursuits fall into their proper places.

A. W. Tozer remarks in *The Pursuit of God*, "If we would find God amid all the religious externals, we must first determine to find Him, and then proceed in the way of simplicity." May we discover the peace and joy that come from pursuing a simple Christianity this week.

DAY 4. Called to be faithful stewards

Read: Matthew 6:1-4; 2 Corinthians 9:6-15.

It's possible to do all the right things for all the wrong reasons. We can read our Bibles, go to church, put money in the collection plate, live an exemplary life—all as a means of serving ourselves. We may be doing these things to ease a guilty conscience, to impress others, or to try to earn God's approval or secure blessings from God.

Jesus calls all that hypocrisy. In those days, some people went to great lengths to do all the right things for all the wrong reasons. They made public displays of giving money to the poor. They made a great fuss as they brought money to the temple. They did all they could to draw attention to themselves. But their giving was not pleasing to God, because they gave to serve their own purposes.

Jesus wants our generosity to be motivated by love and gratitude. When our hearts are awash in the richness of God's kindness to us, our natural response should be generous giving in all areas of life—time, talents, and treasures. We should give without regard for any recognition or reward. Jesus, who was infinitely wealthy, became poor for our sake. Through his poverty, we gain riches beyond compare!

Are you generous in giving to people in need? What motivates your giving? May gratitude to our Lord always be our guide.

Reflect & Apply.

- 1. Would you consider yourself a generous person? What would the Holy Spirit say about your true motivations in your generosity?
- 2. In 2 Corinthians 9:6-15, what would "cheerful" giving look like in your life? Could you think of specific examples or ways?
- 3. What do you hear God saying to you by way of affirmation or challenge through these passages? How will you respond?

DAY 5. Called to Worship

Read: Revelations 4:8-11; Psalm 19.

Heaven's throne room is filled with sounds of praise and worship. The four living creatures give round-the-clock adoration to the One on the throne. "Holy, holy, holy is the Lord God Almighty," they proclaim. This is a picture of all creation honoring God as the Creator and Lord over all things—the only one worthy of all praise.

Creation's song of praise—led by the four living creatures—serves as a call to worship for the twenty-four elders. God's people cannot help responding in worship when surrounded by the authentic, enthusiastic praises of all the rest of creation.

All God's people in his worldwide church—young and elderly, seekers and established followers—help each other celebrate and confess with praise. Together, we join with the rest of creation, saying, "You are worthy, our Lord and God, to receive glory and honor and power, for you created all things, and by your will they ... have their being."


This picture reminds us that just as creation constantly proclaims the glory of God (Psalm 19), so can all God's people—in our work and play each day as well as when we gather for a worship service. All things give glory to God for bringing them into being, and he keeps all creation in his constant care. Our creating, life-sustaining God is worthy to receive our praise always.

Reflect & Apply.

- In a congregational setting, how do you express your worship? If you ask yourself why you express it the way you do, what would be your answer?

Questions for Personal Study & Reflection

This 5-day devotional includes readings with brief commentaries that builds upon the weekend sermon. You are encouraged to take the time to read the Bible passages and meditate on them. On average, you will need 20-30 minutes to complete them.

Reflection questions and applications are intended to invite you to slow down and mediate on the truth that God is teaching you. Daily application steps are also given to help drive the message in practical ways.

DAY 1. CALLED TO LOVE GOD

Read: Matthew 22:35-40.

When asked to highlight the most important commandment in all of Scripture, Jesus responded, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the great and first commandment" (Matthew 22:37-38).

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Reflect & Apply.

- 1. Read James 4:8, Psalm 145:18, Jeremiah 29:18. How intentional have you been when it comes to diligently drawing near to God?
- 2. Do you agree with the statement "You'll never know how to love God until you know how much God loves you"?
- 3. Take some time to think this question through: What is the reason that you aren't loving God as you should? Is it a sin? A relationship? An ambition? Difficult life situation? Financial problem? Honestly ask the Holy Spirit to speak to you.

DAY 2. Called to follow Jesus

Read: Matthew 16:21-27.

Have you tried following two people at the same time? This works only when they're going in the same direction. But what happens if their paths diverge? Imagine you're on a hiking trail with friends, and you reach a fork in the road. If one person wants to go right and the other to go left, you must choose which one to follow.

This principle is also true for Christians, but now our choice is whether to follow *Jesus* or *ourselves*. Most of us will happily follow Jesus as long as he's going where we want. But what happens if he leads us down a road of sacrifice, self-denial, suffering, or even death? Will we still trust him and keep going?

This was the dilemma Jesus' disciples faced. They expected Jesus to deliver them from Roman domination and give them places of honor and authority. But then Jesus told them his path was leading to suffering and death, and if they wanted to follow him, they too must deny themselves and take up their cross.

Many Christians today have the same expectation the disciples had maybe not for a kingdom, but for a happy life. This is just like inviting Jesus to follow us. Self-denial means giving up our right to lead and surrendering to Christ's lordship over our life. Though his path isn't easy, he alone knows the way to the Father's house.

Reflect & Apply.

- 1. Was Peter wrong for not wanting Jesus to die? Was there a time when you wanted God to act one way and he didn't?
- 2. When you think of something you're afraid of, in what ways does it control your thoughts and actions?
- 3. We tend to see life in terms of the power and possessions we have, but God sees the value of life in spiritual growth that leads to the character and relationships we form. How do you struggle in this area? What would it take to succeed in God's ways more, instead of yours?

DAY 3. CALLED TO USE OUR GIFTS

Read: Romans 12:6-8; Ephesians 4:7-12; 1 Peter 4:10.

Loving others includes using the gifts provided by God's Spirit. Each of us has talents and abilities we can use to bring glory and honor to God. In addition, we have spiritual gifts "for the common good" (1 Corinthians 12:7). As we find in Romans 12, 1 Corinthians 12, 1 Peter 4, and Ephesians 4, there are many gifts of the Spirit: prophecy, faith, giving, encouragement, wisdom, hospitality, and more. Each of us has at least one gift, and with it we can serve others and testify to God's grace.

Whatever gifts we have need to be used. That begins by recognizing and acknowledging what gifts we have. We need to discover our giftedness so that we can use it to express love. If we are reluctant or prefer to be modest in acknowledging our giftedness, let's remember that God equips those whom he calls.

Whatever gifts we are given are to be used for the sake of others. Our communities and our families need us to use our gifts. The effectiveness of the body of Christ is diminished when even one person decides to "sit on the gift" entrusted to them. As an ancient confession of the church, the *Heidelberg Catechism*, puts it, "Each member should consider it a duty to use these gifts readily and cheerfully for the service and enrichment of the other members." Do you?

Reflect & Apply.

- Do you have a passionate excitement to discover and use your gifts? Have you ever looked at another person's gifts and desired for them? Is this wrong?
- 2. As a Christian, what evidence is there that God has used you in fruitful ways?
- 3. What can you do to strengthen the spiritual gifts in you that need strengthening? Are there some gifts that you have neglected?
